### Homeless Housing Resources

#### *Public Housing and Housing Choice Voucher Program (HCV)<sup>1</sup>*

Currently, there are 125 PHAs in North Carolina operating under 12 Continuums of Care. PHAs administer HCV and public housing programs. Of the 125 PHAs in North Carolina, 27 administer only an HCV program; 57 administer only a public housing program; and 41 operate both.

22 of the PHAs also administer special purpose vouchers that have been appropriated by Congress exclusively for people with disabilities. This is a statewide total of 2,395 vouchers through the following two programs: 1) Five-Year Mainstream Housing Opportunities for Persons with Disabilities (348 vouchers) and Rental Assistance for Non-Elderly Persons with Disabilities (2047 “NED” Vouchers).<sup>2</sup>

#### *HOME Investment Partnerships Program<sup>3</sup>*

The HOME Investment Partnerships Program is a formula grant of federal housing funds given to states and localities (referred to as “participating jurisdictions” or PJs). As of December 2014, North Carolina has 20 participating PJs. The state of North Carolina received over \$12.9 million in HOME funds in FY 2014.

HOME funds can be used to provide rentals subsidies, as well as to build, buy and renovate rental housing, finance homeownership opportunities, and repair and renovate homes. From October 1- December 2014, North Carolina PJs assisted 154 households with HOME-funded tenant-based rental assistance vouchers.

#### *Continuum of Care Program<sup>4</sup>*

A variety of homeless housing is funded through the Continuum of Care Program, including emergency shelter (ES), safe havens (SH), transitional housing (TH), permanent supportive housing

#### Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG)<sup>5</sup>

The ESG Program provides grants to states and localities for emergency shelter, transitional housing, and permanent housing for the homeless. ESG funds can be used for street outreach, emergency shelter, homelessness prevention, rapid re-housing assistance, and HMIS, as well as administrative activities.

North Carolina had six ESG grants totaling \$5,689,295 in FY2014 funds.

#### Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA)<sup>6</sup>

HOPWA funds are awarded through the Consolidated Plan as a block grant to states and larger metropolitan areas based on their incidences of AIDS and competitively through an annual Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA). HOPWA funds may be used for a wide range of housing, social services, program planning, and development costs. North Carolina has four HOPWA formula awards totaling \$4.3M in FY 2014.

### ***Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing Program (HUD-VASH)<sup>8</sup>***

HUD-VASH is a joint project between the Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) which offers a housing voucher from HUD and intensive case management services provided by the VA for five years. As of 2014, there are 276 VASH vouchers in North Carolina administered by 13 different PHAs.

### ***Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF)<sup>9</sup>***

The SSVF Program funds supportive services which promote housing stability for very low-income Veterans and their families residing in or transitioning to permanent housing. In FY2014, seven

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North Carolina has been a SOAR state since 2007. Over 500 caseworkers are trained through NC SOAR, and there are 23 dedicated SOAR caseworker positions in the state.

### **NORTH CAROLINA RESOURCES**

#### Housing Trust Fund Program<sup>11</sup>

The Housing Trust Fund is North Carolina's only state-funded and state-designed resource for financing affordable housing. It was created by the General Assembly and is managed by the North Carolina Housing Finance Agency, a self-supporting public agency. The Housing Finance Agency pays all of the Trust Fund's administrative costs. All money appropriated by the General Assembly goes directly into "bricks and mortar."

The Trust Fund has improved housing in all 100 counties, won three national awards, and financed:

- 26,127 homes and apartments
- \$971.4 million of new construction and housing rehabilitation

Since 1987, the General Assembly has provided \$167 million for the Housing Trust Fund. For 2012, the General Assembly provided \$7.9 million for the Housing Trust Fund in recurring funds. The Trust Fund is the state's most flexible housing resource – able to finance home ownership and rental apartments, new construction, rehab and emergency repairs, and supportive housing. It provides the state's largest source of funds for financing supportive housing for the homeless, victims of domestic violence, persons with mental illness, and others with special needs.

#### North Carolina Housing Finance Agency<sup>12</sup>

The North Carolina Housing Finance Agency is a self-supporting public agency whose mission is to create affordable housing opportunities for North Carolinians whose needs are not met by the market. Since its creation in 1973, the Agency has financed more than 231,400 affordable homes and apartments, totaling \$16 billion. The Agency provides financing through the sale of tax-exempt bonds and management of federal tax credit programs, the federal HOME Program, the state Housing Trust Fund, and other programs.

#### State Housing Tax Credit

The State Housing Credit, used by for-profit and non-profit developers, was created by the General Assembly in 1999 to be used in combination with the federal Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC). The State Credit ensures greater affordability and deeper income targeting in LIHTC properties, improves the state's competitiveness for federal funds, and improves economic development in rural and urban communities in North Carolina.

#### Mecklenburg County FUSE Initiative (MeckFUSE)<sup>13</sup>

MeckFUSE is an interagency effort providing 45 new units of supportive housing to individuals that cycle between the criminal justice and homeless shelter systems in Mecklenburg County. MeckFUSE

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All housing and services are paid for through County diversion funds. The chosen service provider, Urban Ministry Center, is a leader in the community in using a Housing First approach. Wrap around support services are provided to tenants, who are not required to accept services as a condition of tenancy. The case manager to client ratio is 1:15, and staff have a variety of experience working with individuals who have had extensive contact with the criminal justice system.

#### Interagency Council for Coordinating Homeless Programs (ICCHP) & Local 10-Year Plans to End Homelessness<sup>14</sup>

The ICCHP advises the governor and the secretary of the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services on issues affecting people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. Through an Executive Order, the ICCHP is charged with providing recommendations for joint and cooperative efforts to better meet the needs of the homeless residents of North Carolina. The ICCHP works with its member agencies on special initiatives aimed at ending homelessness in the state. ICCHP provides minimal funding for specific projects throughout the year.

The ICCHP is shaping homeless policy through support of local communities creating 10-year plans to end homelessness. 12 communities have drafted a mayoral or county chair endorsed 10-year plan, including the City of Durham, Winston-Salem/Forsyth County, and Gilford County, High Point, and Greensboro.

#### North Carolina Coalition to End Homelessness (NCCEH)<sup>15</sup>

The mission of the NCCEH is to end homelessness by creating alliances, encouraging public dialogue, securing resources, and advocating for systemic change. NCCEH works with communities to address root causes of homelessness by developing and implementing data-driven strategies that are focused on permanent housing and appropriate services. NCCEH's policy agenda is focused on bringing about an end to homelessness through prevention, increased access to and flexible funding for services, affordable housing production, increased funding for housing and homelessness programs, and targeting policies that exacerbate poverty.

#### North Carolina Housing Coalition<sup>16</sup>

The North Carolina Housing Coalition is a private, non-profit membership organization working for decent, affordable housing that promotes self-determination and stable communities for low- and moderate-income North Carolinians. The Coalition works to accomplish its mission by supporting its
