#### Snapshot of North Carolina Homelessness

- During federal fiscal year 2013 alone, Lincoln Community Health Center, Inc. in Durham served a total of 31,329 patients, 61.8% who were uninsured and 722 of whom were homeless.<sup>2</sup>
- In 2013, Raleigh had the lowest rate of unsheltered homeless veterans in the country, with less than 1 percent of homeless veterans living outdoors.<sup>3</sup>
- From 2012 to 2013, North Carolina had the 5<sup>th</sup> largest decrease in the number of homeless individuals of any U.S. state, with the homeless population decreasing by 950 people (11.2%).<sup>4</sup>

### Data Snapshots: Populations In Need

#### *Population: Low-Income Individuals and Those Living in Poverty*

##### Numbers of Persons Below the Poverty Line<sup>5</sup>

North Carolina had a poverty rate of 17.5% from 2009 to 2013. The national poverty rate during that time period was 15.4%.

#### *Population: Persons Living With HIV/AIDS<sup>7</sup>*

- An estimated 24,476 people in North Carolina were living with HIV/AIDS (as of December 31, 2014)
- Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Clients in Connecticut in 2012 Income and Housing Status
  - 68.7% (9,212) have incomes below the Federal Poverty Level (FPL)
  - <1% (126) are homeless or in unstable housing
  - 7.9% (1,067) are in temporary housing
  - 91.2% (12,346) are in stable/permanent housing
