### Homeless Housing Resources

The information in this document is intended primarily to provide people working in health care with basic information about homeless assistance and housing programs and resources. It is also intended to provide context for housing, health care, and service providers for discussions on gaps in needed housing and services that support housing stability. ### HOMELESS HOUSING RESOURCES

Financial support for housing for low-income people tends to fall into categories: support to help cover “hard” costs (such as construction and rehabilitation) and support to cover more flexible “soft” costs, such as vouchers, operating costs, and services. Resources are often focused on a particular population (e.g. people with disabilities, people living with HIV/AIDS, people experiencing homelessness, veterans).

#### ***HUD Resources***

HUD provides a variety of resources to states, local governments, and nonprofit housing agencies to provide access to or in order to develop affordable housing.

#### **Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Program<sup>1</sup>**

The Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) program provides rental assistance for low-income individuals and families. The HCV Program provides “tenant-based” rental assistance under Section 8 by providing low-income households with a voucher they can use to rent any private apartment that meets program guidelines. Section 8 also offers “project-based” rental assistance, which provides rental housing to low-income households in privately owned and managed rental units, but in which the subsidy stays with the building.

**Currently, there are 169 PHAs in the state of New York, excluding New York City. Of those, 29 administer only a public housing program, 86 administer only an HCV program, and 54 administer both.**

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#### Special Purpose Vouchers<sup>2</sup>

Special purpose vouchers have been appropriated by Congress exclusively for people with disabilities. They are an invaluable resource for meeting the housing needs of people with disabilities because they must be set aside for people with disabilities even when they turn over and are re-issued. Vouchers are targeted exclusively to people with disabilities through the following programs:

#### **Five-Year Mainstream Housing Opportunities for Persons with Disabilities**

These vouchers are set aside exclusively for people with disabilities. They are funded through the Section 811 tenant-based rental assistance program (25% of the program’s appropriations have been used for tenant-based rental assistance). PHAs<sup>3</sup> receive 5-year annual contributions contracts.

#### **Rental Assistance for Non-Elderly Persons with Disabilities (“NED” Vouchers)**

Over the past decade, HUD has also awarded over 55,000 other vouchers targeted to non-elderly people with disabilities, now referred to as NED vouchers.

Although vouchers are an invaluable resource for helping homeless and low-income individuals with disabilities, PHAs often have substantial waiting lists for applicants to receive HCV and special purpose vouchers; lists may be also closed when the wait for housing becomes unreasonable.

### HOME Investment Partnerships Program<sup>4</sup>

The federal government created the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) in 1990. The HOME program is a formula grant of federal housing funds given to states and localities (referred to as “participating jurisdictions” or PJs). **As of December 2015, New York had 29 participating PJs. Since 1992, PJs in Upstate New York have received over \$1.38 billion in HOME funds.**

HOME funds can be used to:

- Build, buy, and renovate rental housing;
- Finance homeownership opportunities;
- Repair homes, including making buildings physically accessible; or
- Provide rental subsidies to eligible households.

### National Housing Trust Fund (NHTF)<sup>5</sup>

The federal government created the National Housing Trust Fund in 2008, but it has not been operating due to insufficient funding. Funds are now being set aside, and HUD anticipates that allocations began in 2016. The NHTF program is a formula grant of federal funds given to states and state-designated entities. Each state determines its priority housing need for production or preservation, primarily of rental housing, that is affordable and available to extremely low-income households. A state must use at least 80 percent of each annual grant for rental housing; up to 10 percent for homeownership; and up to 10 percent for the grantee's reasonable administrative and planning costs.

NHTF funds can be used for:

- New construction of rental and homebuyer units;
- Acquisition or acquisition/rehabilitation of rental and homebuyer units; or
- Operating costs for rental projects (up to one third of annual grant).

To receive its share of the NHTF, a state must submit an allocation plan as part of its annual action plan. The HUD Office of Community Planning and Development issued a Notice on January 28, 2016 outlining the timing for states and entitlement jurisdictions to submit their FY16 consolidated plans, action plans, and NHTF allocation plans. HUD expects to announce the amount of NHTF funds each state will receive in April 2016. **On May 6, 2016, HUD announced the amount of NHTF funds each state will receive, including an allocation of \$3,522,622.**

Information on New York's Housing Trust Fund Program is presented later in this document.

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#### Continuum of Care (CoC) Program<sup>6</sup>

New York has 27 active Continuums of Care (CoCs), 25 of which are outside the New York City area:

- In January 2015, Upstate New York had **8,519 total beds** dedicated for homeless persons year-round. About **55.2%** of the total beds in New York were in emergency shelters/safe havens and **54.8%** were in transitional housing programs.
- Upstate New York also had a total of **12,049 permanent housing beds**, of which **90.4%** were in permanent supportive housing and **5.1%** were in Rapid Re-Housing. The remaining **4.5%** of beds were in other forms of permanent housing, including PH - Housing with Services (no disability required for entry) and PH - Housing Only.

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### Homeless Housing Resources

#### Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG)<sup>7</sup>

The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program provides grants to states and localities for emergency shelter, transitional housing, and permanent housing for the homeless. ESG funds can be used for street outreach, emergency shelter, homelessness prevention, rapid re-housing assistance, and HMIS, as well as administrative activities. ESG funds may also be used to fund Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Programs (HPRP). **In 2015, 18 cities and counties in New York (excluding New York City) received ESG grants totaling \$6,127,692. Additionally, the state of New York itself received an ESG grant of \$6,095,906.**

#### Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS Program (HOPWA)<sup>8</sup>

HOPWA funding provides housing assistance and related supportive services by grantees who are encouraged to develop community strategies and form partnerships with nonprofit organizations. Funds may be used for a range of housing, social services, program planning, & development costs.

HOPWA funds are awarded through the Consolidated Plan as a block grant to states and larger metropolitan areas based on the incidences of AIDS, and competitively through an annual Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA). In 2015, New York State (excluding New York City) received six HOPWA formula awards totaling nearly \$5.9M. *HOPWA Program providers are listed in the Appendix.*

### VA Supportive Housing Program (VASH)<sup>9</sup>

VASH is a joint project between the Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The goal of the program is to transition veterans from homelessness to having permanent, secure, safe housing so that they may rebuild their lives. This program is administered with a housing voucher from HUD for veterans to rent a home or an apartment, and intensive case management services provided by the VA for five years. **From 2008 to 2015, 1,942 VASH vouchers have been awarded to 10 PHAs in New York to serve veterans living outside New York City, including a total of 895 vouchers awarded to the New York State Housing Trust Fund Corporation.**

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### *Other Federal Resources*

#### Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF)<sup>10</sup>

The SSVF Program is a VA program that awards grants to private nonprofit organizations and consumer cooperatives that will provide supportive services to very low-income Veterans and their families residing in or transitioning to permanent housing. The grantees will provide a range of supportive services designed to promote housing stability. **For 2016, 20 organizations in New York received SSVF Awards.**

#### SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery Program (SOAR)<sup>11</sup>

Through its SOAR program, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) seeks to end homelessness through increased access to Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Income (SSDI) support. Nationally, 37 percent of all applications for SSI/SSDI are approved upon first application. However, for people who are homeless, initial SSI/SSDI application approval is only 15 percent. When homeless people apply for SSI/SSDI through the SOAR Initiative, initial application approval is greatly increased – 93 percent of persons thought to be eligible are approved within 3 months.

SOAR training is conducted in New York state through the SOAR online course, which is free and open to anyone. There are 29 local SOAR leads and 100 SOAR trainers across the state.

#### Federal Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) Program<sup>12</sup>

The LIHTC program is administered by the U.S. Department of Treasury. In New York, the New York State Homes and Community Renewal (HCR) agency administers the LIHTC program. The program provides competitive awards of federal tax credits to developers to assist in the creation of affordable rental housing including supportive housing. It requires that 20 percent of LIHTC units be made available for households at or below 50 percent of area median income (AMI) or that 40 percent of LIHTC units be made available for households at or below 60 percent of AMI. **New York State will allocate an estimated \$46,500,000 LIHTCs in 2016.**

### *New York Resources*

#### Funding – Special Initiatives – Coordination

#### House NY 2020 and Homeless Action Plan<sup>13</sup>

In January 2016, Governor Andrew Cuomo announced his proposal to invest \$20 billion over five years in two historic proposals – a \$10 billion House NY 2020 Plan for affordable housing, and a \$10 billion Homelessness Action Plan.

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Governor Cuomo is proposing to create and preserve 100,000 affordable housing units across the state through the House NY 2020 Plan. This proposal is to build and preserve affordable units and individual homes; make homeownership affordable for first-time buyers; increase investments in the revitalization of communities; promote housing choice opportunities for all New Yorkers; revamp services in ways that better serve clients; and directly support permanent housing programs for those struggling with homelessness.

Additionally, Governor Cuomo's proposal includes \$10.4 billion to combat homelessness. This funding will support the creation of 6,000 new supportive housing beds, 1,000 emergency beds, and expanded homelessness services over the next 5 years. Over 15 years, the State will add 20,000 new units, building upon 44,000 existing supportive housing units that the state already funds. This investment marks the largest commitment to addressing homelessness in New York State history.

#### New York State Department of Homes and Community Renewal (HCR)<sup>14</sup>

HCR funds services for low to middle income households and for special needs populations including veterans, seniors, homeless families, individuals with HIV/AIDS, and at-risk youth. HCR is also charged with carrying out the Governor's \$10 billion HOUSE NY plan by leveraging New York's federal and state community development resources, creating affordable housing opportunities statewide.

#### Low-Income Housing Trust Fund Program

New York's Low-Income Housing Trust Fund Program (HTF) provides funding in the form of grants to eligible applicants to construct low-income housing, to rehabilitate vacant, distressed or underutilized residential property, or to convert vacant or underutilized non-residential property to residential use for occupancy by low-income homesteaders, tenants, tenant-cooperators, or condominium owners. HTF also provides seed funding to eligible non-profit applicants who need financial assistance to develop a full HTF project application.

HTF projects must be located in blighted, deteriorated, or deteriorating areas. Units must be affordable to residents with incomes up to 80% of AMI. The vacancy requirement does not apply to one- and two-unit residential properties if rehabilitation creates at least one additional unit. Funding is limited to \$125,000 per unit and project sponsors must ensure long-term use (15 to 30 years) by low-income persons. Up to 10 percent of an HTF award can be used for a community service facility. Since its inception in 1985, HTF has received annual appropriations between \$25 and \$39 million.

#### New York State Low-Income Housing Tax Credit Program (SLIHC)

Signed into law in 2000, the SLIHC is modeled after the federal LIHTC program. SLIHC provides a dollar-for-dollar reduction in state taxes to investors in qualified low-income housing. SLIHC-assisted units must serve households whose incomes are at or below 90% of the area median income (vs. the 60% standard of the federal program).

#### Homes for Working Families Program (HWF)

HWF provides gap financing through low-interest loans for capital costs and related acquisition and soft costs associated with the new construction or rehabilitation of affordable housing. The primary

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financing sources for HWF projects must be tax-exempt bonds which are allocated from the State's Private Activity Bond Volume Cap and 4% Low-Income Housing Tax Credit issued in conjunction with the bonds.

### Housing Development Fund (HDF)

HDF is a revolving loan fund established in 1966 to provide loans to nonprofit organizations to develop low-income housing projects. HDF loans may be used for pre-development costs, site acquisition, construction/ rehabilitation financing, and other mortgageable project development costs. HDF loans may also be used to provide short term financing repaid from equity contributed by investors in low-income housing credit projects.

### 80/20 Housing Program

HCR's Housing Finance Agency (HFA) offers tax-exempt financing to multifamily rental developments in which at least 20% of the units are set aside for low-income residents ("80/20" projects). At least 20% of the units must be set aside for households with incomes at 50% or less of the local AMI, adjusted for family size. Alternatively, 40% or more of a project's units must be affordable to households whose income is 60% or less than the local AMI, adjusted for family size.

### Rural Rental Assistance Program

The Rural Rental Assistance Program provides direct rent subsidies to project owners for low-income elderly and family tenants residing in multifamily projects in rural areas of New York State. The program provides up to 25 years of rental subsidies for projects financed with mortgages from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Housing Services (RHS) 515 Program.

### Access to Home Program

The Access to Home Program provides financial assistance to property owners to make dwelling units accessible for low- and moderate income persons with disabilities. This program served as the template for the creation of the **Access to Home for Veterans Program**, which provides financial assistance to property owners to make dwelling units accessible for low- and moderate-income veterans living with a disability, as well as the **Access to Home for Medicaid Program**.

### Nursing Home Transition and Diversion (NHTD) Housing Subsidy Program

HCR's NHTD Housing Subsidy Program provides rental assistance to Nursing Home Transition and Diversion Medicaid waiver participants in New York State. The goal of this partnership between DHCR and the NYS Department of Health is to provide alternatives to nursing home placement for seniors and for people with disabilities ages eighteen or over by assisting them with safe, decent, accessible & affordable housing and at home services appropriate to their needs.

### New York State Department of Health Medicaid Redesign Team Supportive Housing Initiative<sup>15</sup>

The Medicaid Redesign Team (MRT) Supportive Housing Workgroup was reconvened by Governor Cuomo in 2013 to continue its work on supportive housing initiatives. The MRT Supportive Housing

### Homeless Housing Resources

Initiative funds innovative pilot projects, capital, rental subsidies and supportive services. For FY 2015-2016, the MRT Supportive Housing Work Group allocated \$47 million in funding for capital purposes to expand supportive housing units for high cost Medicaid populations, including \$10,000,000 in MRT capital funds to be awarded through the Homeless Housing and Assistance Program (HHAP).

New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA)<sup>16</sup>

### Homeless Housing and Assistance Program

The Homeless Housing and Assistance Program (HHAP) provides capital grants and loans to not-for-profit corporations, charitable and religious organizations, municipalities and public corporations to acquire, construct or rehabilitate housing for persons who are homeless and are unable to secure adequate housing without special assistance. Projects eligible for HHAP funding may serve families, single persons, youth, the elderly, as well as a range of special needs groups such as the homeless mentally disabled, victims of domestic violence, veterans and persons with AIDS.

HHAP meets a distinct need within New York by developing housing that falls outside the purview of traditional low and moderate income housing initiatives. HHAP has provided capital funding for a wide range of housing types for various homeless special needs populations, including but not limited to:

- Emergency and transitional facilities for victims of domestic violence
- Transitional housing for adolescents aging out of foster care
- Programs for homeless and runaway youth
- Transitional programs for people in recovery
- Supported housing for veterans, people living with HIV/AIDS, ex-offenders, substance abusers, the chronic homeless, and the severely and persistently mentally ill

Projects that receive both HHAP and MRT funds must provide permanent supportive housing to homeless single individuals who exhibit conditions or histories recognized to be associated with high Medicaid usage, and be located in the upstate and suburban regions. Examples include, but are not limited to single adults who have experienced chronic homelessness, physical disability, mental illness, substance abuse, and/or other disabling conditions. *[Please see the Appendix for a list of HHAP and STEHP providers, as they overlap.]*

### Solutions to End Homelessness Program (STEHP)

The STEHP program provides assistance for individuals and families to remain in or obtain permanent housing, and assistance with supportive services during their experience of homelessness, the eviction process and housing stabilization. STEHP supports comprehensive programs that are designed to help maintain and improve the quality of emergency and transitional shelters, and drop-in centers for homeless individuals and families. STEHP assists organizations to meet the costs of operating programs that provide comprehensive supportive services aimed at housing stabilization, rapid re-housing services, and eviction prevention assistance to individuals and families.

The STEHP program is funded by a combination of HUD and New York State homeless assistance funds. In 2014, approximately \$15.3 million annually was awarded to not-for-profits, units of local

government, and local social service districts. The 72 contracts awarded began October 1, 2014 and will end on September 30, 2019. *[Please see the Appendix for a list of HHAP and STEHP providers, as they overlap.]*

#### **New York State Supportive Housing Program (NYSSHP)**

The New York State Supportive Housing Program (NYSSHP) - which consolidated the Single Room Occupancy Support Services Program (SRO) and the Supported Housing for Families and Young Adults (SHFYA) into one unified program – is designed to provide supportive services to eligible residents of supported housing to assist them in achieving as self-sufficient a life as possible. Eligible populations include single adults, young adults (18-25), and families that are in need of supportive services. The service provision for all populations should be designed to assist residents in remaining stably housed so that they do not enter or re-enter the homeless services system. The State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2014 appropriation was approximately \$26M, providing support to 140 contracts. A new RFP is anticipated to be released in May 2016.

#### **Operational Support for AIDS Housing (OSAH)**

The OSAH program provides operating funding to HHAP projects that house individuals and families experiencing homelessness and living with HIV/AIDS. The SFY 2014 allocation was \$982,000. OSAH funds currently support the operations of 9 HHAP projects. Funds are utilized for costs associated with personnel, supplies, utilities, consultants, travel, equipment, contractual obligations, maintenance needs and rental subsidies. OSAH funded programs also allow for recreational activities, tutoring for school aged children, chemical abuse counseling, and nutritional services. *[Please see the Appendix for a list of community providers that are a part of OSAH's homeless and housing programs.]*

#### **New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS)<sup>17</sup>**

#### **Upstate Permanent Supportive Housing Initiative**

The Upstate Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) Program is the first instance of OASAS offering state aid funding for rental subsidies, case management, and employment services for individuals and families in recovery in upstate New York. OASAS PSH providers provide supportive services appropriate to the needs of the program participants: single adults and families in recovery who began a course of treatment and/or recovery when they were homeless.

The initiative supports 53 units of housing for individuals and families in recovery. Currently, there are six OASAS Upstate PSH Providers:

- Catholic Charities of Cortland County
- Credo Community Center for the Treatment of Addictions, Inc.
- Liberty Resources
- Cazenovia Recovery Systems, Inc.
- Finger Lakes Addiction Counseling and Referral Agency
- Mid-Hudson Addiction Recovery Centers, Inc.

OASAS also received \$5 million dollars from the MRT Permanent Supportive Housing Initiative's \$75 million appropriation. OASAS awarded the \$5 million to 18 provider agencies to operate 300 units of MRT housing. The funding includes rental subsidies and other occupancy costs for apartments, program supervision, housing counseling and employment counseling.

### Housing Programs - Homeless Assistance Resources

#### CARES Housing<sup>18</sup>

CARES Housing operates a permanent supportive housing program in Albany for individuals and families who are homeless and who are living with HIV/AIDS. In addition to housing, participants receive on-going case management designed to assist them in accessing community-based support services in order to maintain independent living.

#### Central New York Services<sup>19</sup>

Central New York Services provides housing opportunities for low-income and homeless individuals with substance abuse and/or mental health diagnoses in Oneida and Onondaga counties.

In **Onondaga County**, CNYS operates the following housing programs specifically for clients who are homeless and for persons living with HIV/AIDS:

- **Susan's Place:** Community based apartment program serving women diagnosed with mental health and other disabilities who are transitioning out of homelessness. Collaborative program with NYS Office of Mental Health overseeing a portion of apartments reserved for women with mental health issues and HUD regulating the portion open to women with other disabilities.
- **Recovery Permanent Supported Housing Programs (RPSHP/RPSHP II):** Assist adults with a mental health diagnosis locate housing within the community. Both programs provide case management as needed and require a transition from homelessness as defined by HUD.
- **Welch Terrace:** Residential opportunity for consumers with HIV-related disabilities.

CNYS also offers a number of housing programs in Onondaga County for individuals with a mental health diagnosis, substance abuse issues, and/or an Axis I diagnosis that may be available to, but are not specified for, individuals experiencing homelessness.

In **Oneida County**, CNYS offers the following assisted living programs for individuals who are homeless:

- **Shelter Plus Care:** Designed to maintain stable housing for homeless adults with substance abuse and/or mental health diagnoses.
- **Supportive Living:** Support services for homeless adults with Axis I diagnosis of substance abuse who are actively engaged in substance abuse treatment.
- **Dual Recovery Supportive Living:** Support services for homeless adults with Axis I Mental Health and Substance Abuse diagnosis who are actively engaged in substance abuse and mental health treatment.

Case management services are provided to clients of all assisted living programs, including development of an Individualized Service Plan (ISP) and biweekly or monthly home visits.

#### Salvation Army – Syracuse<sup>20</sup>

The Salvation Army Syracuse provides shelter and residential services to more than 3,000 youth in the community.

- **Booth House:** Shelter and counseling service for runaway and homeless youth, ages 13-17. Booth House is certified to provide emergency housing through two different formats: a 15-bed group shelter and county-based “host families”. The program offers a variety of crisis services including family mediation, case management, home schooling, living skills and recreational activities.
- **Barnabas House:** Co-ed group facility offering short-term transitional housing for up to eight older homeless youth (four males and four females).
- **Barnabas Apartments:** 18-month housing program for seven homeless male youth
- **The Transitional Apartments and Parenting Center (TAPC):** 24-unit apartment complex providing long-term transitional housing, case management, and parenting classes for homeless pregnant and parenting adolescent girls, ages 16-21
- **State Street Apartments:** 6-bed, co-ed residential housing unit for homeless young adults (18-25) with diagnosed mental illness. The program offers intensive mental health case management services in a supportive environment.

#### Liberty Resources<sup>21</sup>

Liberty Resources, headquartered in Syracuse, offers a number of residential services for vulnerable populations, including individuals with alcohol and substance abuse issues, individuals who have suffered a brain injury, survivors of domestic violence, persons living with HIV/AIDS, and individuals with serious and persistent mental illness. For individuals who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, Liberty Resources offers specialized housing support through the **MRT Permanent Supportive Housing Program, the Upstate Permanent Supportive Housing Program, and the DOH MRT Supportive Housing Health Home Pilot Project.**

Additionally, Liberty Resources operates the **MESA Commons Complex**, which provides permanent housing to families living with HIV/AIDS who are homeless or housing vulnerable. In MESA Commons, a supportive housing counselor provides limited case management, tenant conflict resolution, and linkages and referrals to Syracuse area services.

#### DePaul<sup>22</sup>

DePaul provides addiction prevention and support services, affordable housing, mental health programs, senior living communities, and vocational programs in 6 New York counties (Erie, Monroe, Genesee, Niagara, Wyoming, and Orleans).

- **Permanent Supported Housing for the Homeless program:** Permanent supportive housing options to consumers in Erie County who are homeless and either seriously and persistently mentally ill (SPMI), or mentally ill/chemically addicted (MICA). Staff collaborate with recipients to locate and secure apartments, establish households by helping to purchase furniture and

household items, develop a support plan, and identify service gaps while facilitating subsequent linkages.

- **Supported Housing Program:** A non-certified Office of Mental Health program that secures permanent housing for populations in Erie, Monroe, Genesee, Niagara, Wyoming, and Orleans Counties, including the mentally ill, mentally ill/chemically addicted, people experiencing homelessness. Staff provide resources for consumers with limited incomes to successfully find housing that meets their needs. Individuals receive an affordable apartment, linkages to necessary community supports, and advocacy.

#### Sojourner House at Pathstone<sup>23</sup>

**Sojourner House's Supportive Housing Program** currently operates three apartment complexes, **Monica Place, Fairchild Place and Nancy Watson Dean Place**, which provide 40 units of permanent supportive housing. Families residing in these apartments are graduates of Sojourner House's Transitional Housing Program, have been referred from social service agencies, or are self-referred.

Sojourner House also offers Permanent supportive apartments through the **Supportive Suburban Housing Initiative**. Opened in 2007, twenty-two apartments are designated for homeless families with disabilities who need case management and supportive services. A Family Services Coordinator assists clients to develop a personal plan to achieve stability and self-sufficiency.

#### Spiritus Christi Prison Outreach (SCPO)<sup>24</sup>

SCPO operates extensive outreach efforts into the criminal justice system through jail/prison groups and works to provide structured residency and permanent housing programs for homeless ex-offenders in Monroe County. SCPO's housing programs include:

- **Jennifer House:** Serves homeless women with a criminal history who are entering the community from jail, in-patient facilities, the street, and other homeless situations.
- **Nielsen House:** Serves homeless men with a criminal history who are entering the community from jail, in-patient facilities, the street, and other homeless situations.
- **Shelter Plus Care:** Provides permanent housing for men and women who were previously homeless and who have demonstrated an ability to maintain sobriety and work towards goals of economic self-sufficiency.

#### Providence House<sup>25</sup>

Providence Housing develops, finances, and manages affordable housing for seniors, individuals with special needs, and families. It operates the **Clark Park supportive housing program** for families who are homeless or at-risk of becoming homeless, and the **Son House supportive housing program** for individuals who are homeless and have HIV/AIDS, a chronic substance use disorder, or mental illness. Providence House also operates a **Shelter Plus Care program**, which serves people experiencing homelessness and suffering from chemical addiction who are graduating from a transitional housing facility specifically designed for homeless persons, are in the process of being evicted within 7 days from a private dwelling, or have a diagnosis of AIDS or AIDS related diseases.

Additionally, Providence House operates the **Veterans Permanent Housing Program**, designed to provide permanent housing to income-eligible households who are a minimum of 18 years of age, are low-income, have veteran status by national standards, are homeless by HUD standards, and have been diagnosed as having a disability.

#### Joseph's House and Shelter<sup>26</sup>

Joseph's House and Shelter, Inc. is a Troy community-based, not for profit corporation whose purpose is to prevent and alleviate homelessness. The **Hill Street Inn** (18 studio and 2 one-bedroom apartments) and The **Lansing Inn** (26 studio apartments in the former Phoenix Hotel) comprise the Joseph's House Supportive Housing Program. Tenants of the Inns are seriously and persistently mentally ill men and woman who are chronically homeless, with approximately 75% being dually diagnosed with an active alcohol and/or substance abuse problem. All tenants have a Case Manager who works with them to provide linkages to outside providers such as medical doctors, psychiatrists, clinicians, and treatment when the tenants are ready. On-site support services, such as daily living skills, coordinated care management, entitlement advocacy and basic life skills, are provided to help tenants increase their overall independence.

Joseph's House also operates the **Bethune Program**, which provides scattered-site permanent supported housing to formerly homeless families with children headed by an adult with a disability. Heads of household are the lease holders on private housing stock apartments located throughout the City of Troy. Each household pays rent equal to 30% of the head of household's income. The balance of the rent is paid using HUD rental assistance. Support services focusing on housing stability.

#### Albany Housing Coalition, Inc.<sup>27</sup>

The Albany Housing Coalition works to find sustainable solutions to veteran homelessness through outreach/education, treatment, prevention, housing/supportive services, employment services, and community partnerships. Veterans housing programs operated by Albany Housing Coalition include:

- **The Vet House:** Transitional residence for 28 veterans
- **Richard J. Conners Veterans Home:** Permanent supportive housing for 12 formerly homeless, disabled veterans

The Albany Housing Coalition also provide clients with access to Veterans Service Managers, who provide counseling and referrals to services.

#### Homeless and Travelers Aid Society (HATAS)<sup>28</sup>

HATAS programs, which serve homeless individuals within Albany County and the Capital Region, include 88 units of housing, mental health, 24/7 emergency shelter, rapid rehousing, veteran housing, and employment assistance. HATAS operates the following permanent supportive housing programs:

- **Shelter Plus Care:** Provides rental subsidies and case management for homeless people disabled by mental illness. Consumers are linked to treatment and community services.

- **Pathways Projects (Pathways and Family Pathways):** Integrates housing and employment support services for 28 households with a history of homelessness and a disabling condition. Includes rental subsidies, service planning, job-readiness training, employment placement assistance, case management, referrals to treatment, and other community services.

#### Catholic Family Center – LaFayette Housing<sup>29</sup>

**Lafayette Housing** provides 13 affordable apartments along with case management for families and individuals experiencing or at risk of homelessness in Monroe County. **Lafayette Housing II** has an additional 13 apartments for families meeting the same criteria. Residents receive case management services that include intake/assessment service planning, information/referral and follow-up; alcohol/substance abuse and mental health referrals; and on-site drug and alcohol education, literacy training, employability assessments, and other services as needed.
