## Data Snapshots: Populations In Need

### *Population: Persons Experiencing Homelessness<sup>1</sup>*

#### Point-in-Time Count

- 2014 PIT data estimates a total of 5,712 people were in emergency shelters, transitional housing, or safe havens in Wisconsin (including seasonal beds).
- According to 2014 PIT data, 343 homeless individuals are unsheltered on any given night in the state.
- Approximately 1 in 211 Wisconsin residents experienced homelessness in 2014.

#### Substance Abuse and Mental Illness

- Of those counted during the 2014 Wisconsin PIT count, 897 homeless individuals (14.8% of the total homeless population) experienced chronic substance abuse.
- 1,169 individuals (19.3%) were reported as having severe mental illness.

#### Veteran Homelessness

- Statewide, there were 520 homeless veterans counted during the 2014 PIT count, 24 of whom were in unsheltered.
- As a whole, veterans made up 8.5% of the homeless population in Wisconsin in 2014.

#### Chronic Homelessness

- Across Wisconsin, there were 524 chronically homeless persons counted during the 2014 PIT count.
- Chronically homeless persons made up 9.2% of the homeless population in the state, significantly lower than the 2014 national average of 15.8%.

#### Homeless Subpopulations

- In 2014, 18 homeless individuals in Wisconsin (less than 1% of the total homeless population) reported living with HIV/AIDS.
- Of those counted during the 2014 Wisconsin PIT count, More than 1 in 5 (1,323 homeless individuals) reported that they were victims of domestic violence.

#### Unemployment

- Wisconsin's seasonally adjusted August 2015 unemployment rate was 4.5 percent, lower than August's national rate of 5.1 percent.

#### Rent and the Minimum Wage

- In Wisconsin, the housing wage is \$15.52 per hour. "Housing wage" is the hourly wage needed to afford a two-bedroom apartment at Fair Market Rent without paying more than 30% of income on housing. It assumes a 40-hour work week, 52 weeks per year.
- Minimum wage in Wisconsin is \$7.25.

### *Population: Low-Income Individuals and Those Living in Poverty<sup>2</sup>*

#### Percentage of Wisconsin's Population in Poverty by Household Income Level (2013)

Household Income Level	Percentage of Total Population
<b>Under 100% Federal Poverty Level (FPL)</b>	11%
<b>100-199% FPL</b>	15%
<b>200-399% FPL</b>	31%
<b>400% + FPL</b>	42%

Note: Total estimated population of Wisconsin in 2013 was 5.743 million people.

- Individual: \$11,770 (\$11,490 in 2013)
- Family of 2: \$15,930 (\$15,510 in 2013)
- Family of 3: \$20,090 (\$19,530 in 2013)
- Family of 4: \$24,250 (\$23,550 in 2013)

### Ryan White Program Statistics<sup>4</sup>

Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Clients in Wisconsin in 2012 by Housing Status

- Stable/Permanent Housing: 3,758 (88.7%)
- Temporary Housing: 242 (5.7%)
- Unstable Housing: 238 (5.6%)
- Note: Housing status was not reported for 165 clients (3.8%)

Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Clients in Wisconsin in 2012 by Household Income as % of FPL

- Below 100% of FPL – 2,751 (65.2%)
- Between 101-200% of FPL – 959 (22.7%)
- Between 201-300% of FPL – 269 (6.4%)
- Above 300% of FPL – (5.6%)





